From the Pastor's Desk

A number of people famous for their work in entertainment and the arts died in 2009, including ...

■ **Patrick McGoohan**, suave actor who was born in America, grew up in Ireland and did much of his work in England. His TV roles included British spy John Drake in “Secret Agent” and the mysterious Number Six in the Kafkaesque series “The Prisoner.” He also appeared in films, most notably “Ice Station Zebra” and “Braveheart,” in which he played King Edward I.

■ **Ricardo Montalbán**, debonair actor with a cultured persona who played the concierge Mr. Roarke in the TV series “Fantasy Island” and the villain Khan Noonien Singh in “Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan” (1982). He became a devout Catholic, especially after being deeply influenced by a Jesuit priest with a good mind and a fine sense of humor. “Through him, I became a Catholic by conviction. Before, I was an emotional Catholic. I would pray when things went wrong. Conviction doesn’t fluctuate like emotion. It’s steady—and healthier, because it’s constant.” He was married to his wife Georgiana (Loretta Young’s half-sister) for 66 years. After serious spinal surgery in 1993, facing years of recovery, he asked himself whether he really believed what the Our Father said: “Do I believe these words? Or do I just repeat them like a parrot? Do I accept ‘Thy will be done’ or not? When I said, ‘Yes, I do,’ my burden became easier.”

■ **Bob May**, who played The Robot in the TV series “Lost in Space” (“Warning, warning! Danger, Will Robinson!”). June Lockhart, who played Will’s mom, recalled that “He always said he got the job because he fit in the robot suit.”

■ **Alan W. Livingston**, who signed the Beatles (on their fourth approach to Capitol Records, of which he was the president), created Bozo the Clown, paired Frank Sinatra with arranger Nelson Riddle, produced Don MacLean’s “American Pie,” helped create “Bonanza” (by hiring its pilot writer and getting his brother Jay to write the theme music), and co-wrote the 1951 Sylvester and Tweety novelty song “I Taut I Taw a Puddy Tat.”

■ **Dom DeLuise**, naturally funny comic movie actor who appeared in “The Glass Bottom Boat” (1966), “Blazing Saddles” (1974), “Smokey and the Bandit II” (1980) and “The Cannonball Run” (1981).

■ **Lee Solters**, Brooklyn-born old-style press agent of Frank Sinatra and other notables. In the early 1950s he saved a David Merrick Broadway show that was in danger of closing by taking out a newspaper ad with ecstatic blurbs over the names of well-known theater critics. In reality, those quoted were people who happened to have the same names as the critics. Solters recruited them from the phone book, calling them up and helping them create their obliging praise.

■ **Ed McMahon**, Longtime friend of Johnny Carson and his sidekick on the “Tonight” show, which Ed always introduced with his extended cry of “Heeeeere’s Johnny!” Ed, an ex-Marine pilot in World War II and the Korean War, was also a man of many business ventures, not all of them solvent ones.

■ **Farrah Fawcett**, glamorous actress whose career was greatly helped by a best-selling poster and her famous hair style. She was best known for her role in the 1970s TV detective show “Charlie’s Angels.”

■ **Michael Jackson.** He rose to stardom as a cute little boy with his family's singing group, "The Jackson Five." In time, many plastic-surgical and musical changes later, he sold \$750 million worth of music, including 100 million copies of the album "Thriller." In a shrewd business move, he also obtained part-ownership rights to the Beatles' songs. His reclusive life at his lavish "Neverland" estate (which had its own roller coaster) included bizarre and scandalous behavior with children.

■ **Karl Malden,** film actor who played Father Barry in Elia Kazan's "On the Waterfront" (1954), won an Oscar as Mitch in "A Streetcar Named Desire," and portrayed General Omar Bradley in "Patton" (1970). He also played Detective Mike Stone in the TV series "The Streets of San Francisco."

■ **Gordon Walker.** With Peter Asher, he formed the 1960s "British Invasion" singing duo "Peter and Gordon," whose hits included "A World Without Love."

■ **Merce Cunningham,** premier dance master, who often noted the art's momentary quality: "You have to love the dance to stick to it," he wrote. "It gives you nothing back, no manuscripts to store away, no paintings to show on walls and maybe hang in museums, no poems to be printed and sold, nothing but that single fleeting moment when you feel alive."

■ **Mary Travers,** who, with Peter Yarrow and Paul Stookey, starred in the 1960s folk movement as "Peter, Paul and Mary." Their many hits included "Blowing in the Wind," "If I Had a Hammer," "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?," "Lemon Tree," "Leaving on a Jet Plane" and "Puff the Magic Dragon." Their political stance was strongly liberal.

■ **Al Martino,** Popular singer whose hits included "Spanish Eyes" and "Speak Softly, Love," the theme from "The Godfather," in which Martino played the Sinatra-inspired Johnny Fontaine. He also did a marvelous recording of "Lili Marlene." Three days before his sudden death, Martino finished his final album. The last song he recorded for it was Garth Brooks's "If Tomorrow Never Comes."

■ **Vic Mizzy,** theme song writer for TV shows, his most famous being the ones for the comedies "Green Acres" and "The Addams Family." The latter followed the beat da-da-da-dum with two finger snaps. Mizzy said, "That's why I'm living in Bel Air. Two finger snaps and you live in Bel Air."

■ **Soupy Sales,** slapstick comedian and star of children's TV shows. He was most famous for being hit in the face with pies—20,000 over a long career. He was once suspended after telling the kids to go into their moms' pocketbooks and send him the green papers with pictures of the presidents on them. His humor tended toward lovable cornball. For instance:

"Waiter, waiter! There are pennies in my soup!"

"You said you'd stop eating here if there was no change in the food."

■ **Ray Browne,** who founded the field of pop culture studies by starting an M.A. program at Ohio's Bowling Green University. He edited *The Guide to United States Popular Culture* (U. of Wisconsin Press, 2001), a book containing 1,600 articles.

■ **Edward Woodward,** British movie actor who starred in "Breaker Morant" (1980) and "The Wicker Man" (1973), and later played Robert McCall, private rectifier of injustices, in the TV series "The Equalizer" (1985-1989).

■ **Jennifer Jones,** who won an Academy Award for her role as Bernadette Soubirous in "The Song of Bernadette" (1944) and was nominated for Oscars four other times. Her private life was turbulent. She left her husband, actor Robert Walker, to marry David O. Selznick, who ran her career. Walker, who attributed his emotional and drinking problems to losing his wife, died at 32. Her daughter, Mary Jennifer Selznick, committed suicide by jumping off a building at age 21. Jones herself was found in the surf off Malibu Beach in 1967, after swallowing a bottle of sleeping pills.

■ **Arnold Stang,** long-successful supporting actor in comedy films and TV. Of slight build and harmless demeanor, he was perfect for nerd roles. He memorably played one of two attendants whose gas station was wrecked by Jonathan Winters in "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World" (1963). He also did commercials for the "Chunky" candy bar ("Chunky! What a chunk o' chocolate!") and was the voice for Top Cat in the 1960s cartoon series of that name.

Others, notable for a variety of endeavors, who died in 2009:

■ **James Swett,** Marine pilot who, on his first mission, won the Medal of Honor for shooting down 7 Japanese planes off Guadalcanal, in about 15 minutes. (He said it was really 8!) In all, he flew 103 combat missions, downing 16 enemy planes, plus another 9 "probables."

■ **Col. Robert L. Howard.** A Green Beret (Special Forces) sergeant from Alabama who earned a battlefield commission and the Congressional Medal of Honor for a 1968 firefight during which he heroically saved his lieutenant's life while his unit was under attack from 250 North Vietnamese. Howard also received the Distinguished Service Cross (the Army's second-highest award), a Silver Star and 8 Purple Hearts.

■ **Alex Lees.** As a gardener at Germany's Stalag Luft III during World War II, he was one of the "penguins" (dirt disposers) for the 3-24-44 escape of 76 British and US POWs, later made into the 1963 film "The Great Escape." 3 made it back to England, 23 were returned to the camp, and 50 were ordered shot (by Hitler) after their re-capture.

■ **Austin Delaney,** NYC tavern owner who helped many people and causes. He was especially good to recent immigrants, providing loans, steering men to jobs, introducing them to new friends, and many times raising money to cover medical or legal bills—or to ship a body home for burial. One of his friends, Ciaran Staunton, said of him, "He didn't believe you should pull the ladder up after you. It was not only about leaving the ladder for others to climb but reaching down with a hand to help."

■ **Paul Haney,** "voice of Mission Control" for NASA's Project Mercury and for the first 9 Apollo flights.

■ **Millvina Dean,** 97, last survivor of the *Titanic* sinking.

■ **Timothy J. Russert,** father of the late TV newsman Tim Russert, who wrote a best-seller about his dad.

■ **Kim Peek,** savant with an incredible memory who was the basis for Dustin Hoffman's character in the 1988 film "Rain Man." He could read two pages of a book at once, one page with each eye, and could remember what he read. In all, he read 12,000 books. Among many other feats, he memorized Shakespearean plays, all the US ZIP codes, and maps for every major city in the country.

■ **Detective Marc DiNardo (Jersey City P.D.)**. Shot while arresting a robber, he left a wife and three young children. He was a graduate of Hudson Catholic and St. Peter's College. His brother-in-law, Ed Leppard, described him memorably: "Everybody says it, and it's true. He walked into a room, and he was a big guy and you knew he was there, and you loved that he was there. To be that kind of loving and gentle and caring guy, and then to also stand where he stood the other day, and know that there's somebody with a shotgun on the other side, and to still stand there and go through that door, and try to help everybody in this community and help his fellow officers, it's tremendous."

■ **Ray Brown**, Black Catholic Newark defense attorney, widely regarded as the best of his era in New Jersey. His clients included Rubin ("Hurricane") Carter, LeRoi Jones (Amiri Baraka), Joanne Chesimard, Mario Jascalovich (the "Dr. X" accused of killing Bergen County patients with curare), and Joseph ("News Boy") Moriarty of Jersey City, whose car trunk was filled with several million dollars he claimed to know nothing about.

■ **Howard Unruh**. After meticulous planning, he killed 13 residents of Camden on 9-6-49. He spent most of his remaining life in Trenton Psychiatric Hospital's notorious Vroom Building, before finishing his days in a nursing home.

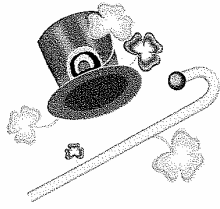

AAA Pledge Weekend

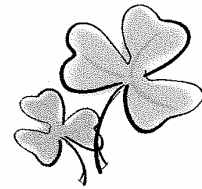
