From the Desk of the Pastor & Dean





The summer and vacation time is certainly slipping away very quickly and is over believe it or not! This thought reminds me of a humorous annual pronouncement of one of my cousins made every Fourth of July when the family gathered for a summer barbeque. He said to everyone, "it's the Fourth of July, the summer is over." While he intended to be humorous, maybe he even believed that statement, I didn't really take it very seriously at that point.

However, as we approach the beginning of September, with Labor Day having just passed, it's safe to say that summer for the most part is over! It would be fruitful for each of us to reflect on the following statement. It has been said, "Unless we take time to rest... our activity will be without direction, our work will become drudgery, and our life will lose meaning."

Summertime offers us a great opportunity for rest, vacation, relaxation, prayer, meditation and recreation. It is a wonderful time of the year to experience the joy, the enthusiasm, the fireworks, parades, picnics and barbeques that all speak of the American way of life and the freedoms and rights we all enjoy as Americans, "One Nation under God with liberty and justice for all".

At times, we all feel the need to relax and take time to "regain our perspective" and "recharge our spirit." If we turn to the New Testament, specifically in the Gospel of St. Mark, we see that even Jesus took time to get away. He says to his disciples, "come away (with me) to a deserted place and rest awhile." We all need to take time off and rest awhile and get in touch with ourselves. We need to connect with the very "core of our being" and communicate with God who dwells there. We need to find Sanctuary and recharge our "spiritual batteries" so to speak. Our lives are similar to the disciples in not only the service we render to family, friends and our society in general but also to Jesus Christ. Vacation time does not mean time away from God. We need to relax our minds and bodies and get in touch with God.

Unfortunately, you and I live in a fast-paced world of modern technology. We have become all too familiar with instant replay, fast food chain restaurants, cell phones, texting, internet, job burnout, mass transit, and most definitely "information overload". We constantly are on the go, racing from one thing to the next. Some even have trouble sleeping at night because they have problems turning off "the motor of emotions" that is racing inside them. Many cannot cope with all the stress of life. We all need rest, silence, and solitude to regain perspective. The people of Rome, Italy, have it right. Some still take a siesta and religiously observe this tradition daily by taking Mondays off. Between 2 - 4 pm many stores are closed. They will tell you "we work to live, not live to work.

Come away to a quiet place by yourselves and rest awhile." "As this was good advice for the apostles in their time, the Church considers it good advice for her priests today." She has prescribed this by Canon Law – that every priest makes a yearly retreat – that he leaves his duties for the better part of a week and devote himself to prayer and meditation. Weeks of vacation are prescribed as well – We all need, from time to time, to get away – get a change of place and pace. We all need to recreate, to make or create anew. We must refresh and revivify our body and soul.

Sir Peter Ustinov, a Hollywood actor and academy award winner, was also an accomplished producer, director, and playwright as well as a successful humorist, musician, author and good will ambassador for the United Nations. Nonetheless when his activities become too much for him, Peter retreated to his home in Switzerland. There, he simply liked to sit in his vineyard and rest awhile.




